2021 Capstone Projects Pioneer Economic and Social Growth for Prince George's County's Seat Pleasant

Ten visions for a slice of Seat Pleasant, Maryland, were presented this past week by students from Maryland's Master of Real Estate Development (MRED) Program in a bid to inspire its future. Community greenspaces, wide thoroughfares and bustling hubs for live-work-play were just a few components—shared with members of the Seat Pleasant City Council, residents and stakeholders—that resulted from a semester-long capstone project that focused on two challenging sites within this Washington, D.C.-bordering community in Prince George's County, that could hold the key to kickstarting development, walkability and community resilience.

The Spring 2021 John B. Colvin Capstone Competition kicked off on Friday night, May 21st, with three dual degree students (MRED + M.ARCH) presenting their projects to a panel of industry experts. Judges included **Ashleigh Simpson**, Director, Regional Head of Acquisitions and Joint Ventures, Real Estate, MetLife Investment Management and **Lisa Wiersma**, Director, Development, Neighborhood Development Company.

Taking top prize was **Tochi Ohakawa** with his project, The Pointe, a mixed-use, mixed-income development located on a 0.72-acre property in downtown San Diego, CA. Other presenters included **Rachel Cain's** project, The I.R.I.S., a mixed-use development with a focus on a built-in multi-sensory environment to promote independent living for the blind and visually impaired in Baltimore County, MD. and, **Andrew Walker's** project, Cayler Point, a mixed-use, mixed-income development located in the Williamsburg neighborhood of Brooklyn, NY., a former brownfield site to be repurposed to create a sustainable development.

On Saturday, May 22nd, the competition continued with 10 students presenting their final capstone projects. Judges included **Van Anderson** '75, Senior Vice President, Sandy Spring Bank, **John Lin**, President, CapStar Commercial Realty and **Lisa Wiersma**, Director, Neighborhood Development Company. Congratulations to first place co-winners **Catherine Roach** and **Nathan Veliz!** Roach's project, Wye Point, focuses on cultivating a wellbeing and nurturing community in Seat Pleasant, MD. Veliz's project, THE VERGE, addresses the need for retail to service the community, job creation and affordable housing. Third place went to **Steven Bernard** for his project, District Line, and honorable mentions went to **Domynique Garrett** for her project, Elysian, and **Weishi Zhang** for East King both in Seat Pleasant, MD.

Zhang grew up in Taiyuan City, Shanxi Province, China and has lived in the United States for the past 3 years pursuing her Master of Real Estate Development degree.
